Words of Welcome: Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung

In recent years regional integration has often been considered as a panacea to overcome political and economic tensions and to stabilise transformation processes. Among these different models the European experience can be considered as the most successful one. The 28-members community has achieved an unprecedented and unique degree of institutional integration. Through its diversity, its values and its self-conceptualisation as 'civil power' Europe has become highly attractive in other regions; by this it can contribute much to ongoing regional integration processes in other parts of the world.

Even with the Euro crisis overshadowing the idea of Europe I am convinced that Europe will keep on its 'integration track' and serve as a role model of a new level of cooperation among nation states or beyond.

The situation in Asia is quite different. Bound by historical burdens, destabilising transformation processes and huge political, economic and ethnic varieties no unifying, overarching framework for regional integration in East- and Southeast Asia has been established so far. With China's breathtaking economic, political and military rise, the 'awakening giant' has still to find its role in Asian integration processes and needs to carefully take steps to build trust among its neighbors. Despite their different historical developments, both, China and Germany, are locked into a paradox situation: serious challenges in their regional environment demand for more responsible and sometimes courageous leadership – and both powers are 'accused' to be too reluctant to fulfill their 'duties.' On the other hand, neighboring countries have raised concerns about these two new 'hegemonies.' To overcome these concerns, more integration on an equal basis is needed.

It is our desire to provide an intercultural forum for an in-depth people-to-people exchange of

Chinese and Western scholars, young professionals and students. Thereby they will have a chance to learn and discuss their views and perspectives on the current and future role of China and Germany as leading nations in their respective region.

I am confident that this meeting will provide ample opportunities for its participants to become better informed about the genuine problems of intra- and inter-regional relations and cooperation, and to come up with innovative ideas.

On behalf of the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung, I therefore sincerely thank all contributors of this event for their efforts in helping realize these ambitious goals.

Previous Workshops on Europe-China Relations in Global Politics

First Workshop: Partnership, Competition or Co-Evolution

The First Workshop on Europe-China Relations in Global Politics took place at the School of International Studies at Renmin University of China in March 2012. The overarching theme was “China and Europe in 21st Century Global Politics: Partnership, Competition or Co-Evolution”. Given the simultaneous presence of partnership and competition in China-Europe relations, the Workshop’s purpose was to investigate if Sino-European relations have become what Henry Kissinger has termed a “co-evolution”: both China and Europe “pursue their domestic imperatives, cooperating where possible, and adjust their relations to minimize conflict”. There were four panel themes on the following topics: High Politics and Diplomacy; Socio-Economic Transition; Energy and Environmental Issues; and the Role of Culture. In 2013, the Workshop-conveners Frauke Austermann, Anastas Vangeli and Wang Xiaoguang published an edited volume based on the best papers presented at the Workshop (Cambridge Scholars Publishing). Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung Beijing generously supported the event.

Second Workshop: EU-China Relations under a New Leadership

The Second Workshop on Europe-China Relations in Global Politics again took place at the School of International Studies at Renmin University in March 2013. The overarching theme in the second year was “Strategic Partnership? EU-China Relations under a New Leadership”. The Workshop thereby tied up to governmental changes in both Europe, such as in France or Italy, and in China with Xi Jinping and Li Keqiang replacing the previous top-leaders Hu Jintao and Wen Jiabao. The four specific themes that were addressed related to the Role of (new) Leadership in EU-China Relations; Strategic Resources and Trade Relations; Urbanization and Global Cities; and finally EU-China People-to-People Exchanges. As in the previous year, the event was generously sponsored by Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung Beijing.

Regional Integration in Asia and Europe

Regional integration has become an integral part of contemporary global politics: the European Union fosters ties among its members as a solution to the on-going financial crisis; Europe has started talks with the US to set up a Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP); the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) is taking steps to deepen integration among its members in a number of policy domains; China, Japan and Korea have concluded the first round of negotiations on a Free Trade Agreement in March 2013 while the US remains invested via the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation and the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP); at the same time, sub-state actors in both Asia and Europe are transforming into important foreign policy actors, too.

These phenomena raise many questions: What role do leading countries in Asia and Europe play in regional integration processes, most notably China and Germany? How does regional integration in Asia and Europe change the relations to the US and vice versa? Does regional integration help Asian and European economies and companies keep or regain their competitiveness? What is the impact of regional integration on peripheral countries? And what is the role of sub-state actors like provinces or cities in regional integration? These central questions will be addressed during the Third Workshop on Europe-China Relations in Global Politics.
